INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF EUROPEAN ALLIANCE FOR FREEDOM

We have audited the financial statements of European Alliance for Freedom, set out on pages 7 to 16, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2012 and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Responsibility of the Members of the Board for the Financial Statements

As described in the statement of responsibilities of the Members of the Board on page 4, the Members of the Alliance are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the International Financial Reporting standards, and for such internal control as the Members determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the Members of the Board, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statement.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. ENTITY INFORMATION

The financial statements cover the year ended 31 December 2012. The Alliance's primary objective is to inform the EU public of the importance of parliamentary democracy, to safeguard international cooperation among EU Member States and to make the people of Europe aware of the dangers of super national power to freedom of nations and their constitutional democracies.

1.1 BASIS OF PREPARATION AND STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

1.2 CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND DISCLOSURES

Standards, interpretations and amendments to published standards effective in the current year

The Alliance has adopted the following new and amended IFRS and IFRIC interpretations:

1.3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost. Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Alliance and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. Expenditure on repairs and maintenance of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an expense when incurred.

Office equipment are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or disposal. Gains or losses arising from derecognition represent the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount, and are included in the income and expenditure in the period of derecognition.

Depreciation

Depreciation commences when the depreciable assets are available for use and is charged to the income and expenditure account so as to write off the cost amount, less any estimated residual value, over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

Office equipment	25% per annum
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The depreciation method applied, the residual value and the useful life are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

Receivables

Receivables are classified with current assets and are stated at their nominal value. Appropriate allowances for estimated irrecoverable amounts are recognised in surplus or deficit when there is objective evidence that the asset is impaired.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued

1.3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are classified with current liabilities and are stated at their nominal value.

Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the Alliance and these can be measured reliably. The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before income is recognised:

(i) Interest income

Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the asset's net carrying amount.

(ii) Membership fees and donations

Membership fees and donations are recognised as income when no significant uncertainty as to its collectability exists.

(ii) European parliament grant

European parliament grant are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and that all attaching conditions will be complied with.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise of cash at bank.
